





- (a) Principal buildings 15 metres (50 feet).
- (b) Accessory buildings / containers 4.5 metres (15 feet).

405A.7 Parking and Loading

Parking and loading shall be in accordance with the provisions of Sections 309, 310 and 311 of this Bylaw.



Annual influenza vaccine campaign kicks off in Interior Health

IH-Wide – Interior Health is calling on everyone to protect themselves and increase immunity in our community by getting their annual influenza (flu) vaccine. New this year, the influenza vaccine (flu shot) is available free of charge to everyone six months of age and older, at pharmacies and clinics throughout the region.

"Everyone is at risk of influenza and spreading it to others, and as we continue to face the challenges of COVID-19, we encourage all British Columbians to get immunized," says Dr. Sue Pollock, Interior Health interim chief medical health officer. "Now that the influenza vaccine is available at no cost to everyone who wants one, there's no better time."

Getting your influenza vaccination is the best way to protect yourself and your loved ones from illness this winter. It is also a critical step to keeping the spread of influenza low in the community and through our health system.

Last year, public health measures including handwashing, mask use and physical distancing helped reduce the spread of COVID-19 as well as influenza.

While influenza can make anyone sick, some people are at increased risk of severe disease and complications, including: children under five years of age, people who are pregnant, Aboriginal, over the age of 65 years, and those with underlying chronic health conditions.

The influenza vaccine is available through your pharmacist, community health-care provider (e.g., family physician, nurse practitioner, nurse), First Nations community health nurse, or your local health unit. CIRCULAR

To: All local government chief administrative officers and corporate officers

Re: Bill 26

As you may be aware, on October 26, 2021 <u>Bill 26</u> was introduced in the Legislature. The Bill proposes amendments to various sections in the *Community Charter, Local Government Act, Islands Trust Act, Vancouver Charter, Municipal Replotting Act, Powell River Incorporation Act, Cultus Lake Park Act, University Endowment Land Act, and the Municipalities Enabling and Validating Act (No.4).*

The purpose of this circular is to provide an overview of some of the more significant changes in the Bill, including changes to public notice requirements, public hearing requirements, and a new requirement to consider a code of conduct.

If passed, some of the proposed changes will come into effect immediately (public hearings), while others (public notice and codes of conduct) will not come into force until a regulation is passed, likely in early 2022. For more information about the other proposed changes in the Bill please view the <u>Information Bulletin</u>.

We encourage local governments to begin thinking about how they might incorporate the proposed changes into local government business.

Public Notice

Proposed changes to section 94 of the *Community Charter* would add an option for local governments to adopt a bylaw to provide for alternative means of publication. This change recognizes that local governments are in the best position to determine how to notify and engage community members and provide greater flexibility for them to reach a wider audience.

Where the existing rules are working well for communities there will be no need to change – they can continue to use newspapers for notice. This method of publication will remain the default.

Local governments that want to create their own public notice scheme will need to adopt a public notice bylaw. Prior to adopting a bylaw, local governments must first consider principles of effective public notice which will be defined through regulation which include considerations like accessibility, suitability and reliability.

These changes will be brought into force by regulation in 2022. Once the legislation is in force and the principles of effective public notice have been considered, councils and boards will be able to choose two or more ways (e.g., local government website and newspaper) to meet their statutory public notice obligations.

Additional guidance material will be provided to local governments when the changes are brought into force. There are also several consequential amendments – including changes to regional district and Islands Trust public notice requirements that are summarized in Attachment 2.

Code of Conduct

The legislation would establish a new requirement for all local governments to publicly consider the development of a code of conduct. The change seeks to create a regular process for elected officials to engage in conversations about shared expectations for conduct as they carry out their responsibilities and govern together. This is a next step in ongoing work that the province, the Union of BC Municipalities and the Local Government Management Association have committed to doing together, and the approach was supported by a special resolution endorsed at the Union of BC Municipalities Convention in September 2021.

Within six months of a general local election all municipal councils and regional district boards will have to consider, at an open meeting, whether to establish a new code of conduct or revise an existing one. Principles to guide these discussions will be established by regulation.

If a local government decides not to establish or revise a code of conduct, they will need to make their reasons for this decision publicly available upon request. They will also have to reconsider their decision before January 1 of the year of the next general local election.

These changes will not take effect until a regulation to bring them into force is passed — likely in spring 2022. Additional guidance material will be provided when the changes are brought into force.

Public Hearings

The proposed changes to section 464 of the *Local Government Act* remove the default requirement for local governments to hold public hearings for zoning bylaw amendments that are consistent with the official community plan (OCP). Instead, approval of such zoning bylaws would proceed by default without public hearings, thereby removing the need for local governments to go through the process of waiving these hearings (as currently is required).

In order to maintain transparency in such cases, the amendments will require that a local government provide public notice of the zoning bylaw before the bylaw is considered at first reading by a municipal council or regional district board.

Under the proposed changes, local governments will still have the option to hold a public hearing on a zoning bylaw that is consistent with the OCP, if they so choose.

These proposed amendments are some of the first changes stemming from the <u>Development Approvals Process Review</u> (DAPR), which aims to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of development approvals to increase housing supply. For more information about these changes see the <u>News Release</u>.

Delegation of Authority for Development Variance Permits

Proposed changes to sections 489 and 499 of the *Local Government Act* would enable local governments to delegate development variance permit (DVP) decisions to staff, if the proposed variance is minor and pertains to matters specified in legislation, including:

- zoning bylaws respecting siting, size and dimensions of buildings, structures and permitted uses:
- off-street parking and loading space requirements;
- regulation of signs; and
- screening and landscaping to mask or separate uses or to preserve, protect, restore and enhance natural environment.

These legislative changes respond to feedback received during the DAPR consultations that many technical DVP decisions made by local government councils and boards could be reasonably considered by staff. These changes are designed to support increased efficiency of decision making in development approval processes. The enabling nature of this amendment provides local governments with autonomy in deciding whether to delegate DVP decisions to staff.

Local governments that delegate the power to issue a DVP to staff will be required to include in their delegation bylaw:

- a. Criteria for determining whether a proposed variance is minor
- b. Guidelines that the delegate must consider in deciding whether to issue a DVP

These requirements provide local governments with flexibility in determining what constitutes a minor variance and guiding a delegate that is exercising the power to issue a DVP. This approach helps retain council and board oversight of delegated decisions and establishes a fair application process for all applicants. The proposed legislative changes maintain consistency with the approach the *Local Government Act* takes for other delegated land use permits by providing that an applicant who is subject to a decision of the delegate is entitled to have the local government reconsider the matter. However, delegates that exercise the power to issue a DVP will not be required to provide notice under section 499 of the *Local Government Act*.

Attachment 1: FAQs

Public Notice

Are local governments required to adopt a public notice bylaw?

No. Under the new local choice framework, local governments may choose to adopt a public notice bylaw *or* if they don't adopt a bylaw, the default notice provisions in section 94.1 of the *Community Charter* apply – these are the same publishing requirements that applied to public notice before amendments were made.

If a local government adopts a public notice bylaw, can one of the means be publishing in the local newspaper?

Yes. In some communities, local newspapers are still a regularly published resource. In those communities, local governments may choose to continue to use the default public notice requirements *or* choose to adopt a public notice bylaw that includes newspaper publication as one of the two required means of providing notice.

When can local governments start thinking about adopting a public notice bylaw?

It is anticipated that the amendments to the legislation will not come into force until sometime in 2022. Before deciding on the means of public notice to be included in a bylaw, the local government must consider the principles of effective public notice. These will be outlined in a regulation and are likely to include considerations such as: are the means easy to access; can information be easily retrieved in the future; is the source well-established and reliable.

Will guidance material be available for the new public notice options?

Yes. Detailed guidance material will be made available to inform local governments of the changes and the public notice options available. Ministry staff will be engaging with local government staff in the development of these materials, which will be available in early 2022 when the amendments are anticipated to be brought into force.

Code of Conduct

Are local governments required to adopt a code of conduct?

There is no requirement for municipal councils or regional districts to adopt a code of conduct, but they must publicly consider and decide whether or not to adopt one or review an existing one. If they choose not to create or review a code of conduct, they must be prepared to make available their reasons for this decision.

What do local governments need to consider before deciding whether to establish or review

a code of conduct?

Municipal councils and regional district boards must consider the prescribed principles of codes of conduct and any other prescribed matters before making their decision. The prescribed principles will be outlined in a regulation and it is anticipated they will be similar to the <u>foundational principles of responsible conduct</u>. Further information and guidance on consideration for codes of conduct will be made available when the new sections come into force.

When would the consideration of a code of conduct need to occur?

The first-time local governments would be required to consider and make a decision about adopting a code of conduct or reviewing an existing one, would be within six months of its first council meeting following the 2022 general local election. If a local government decides to adopt or review a code of conduct, they would not be required to reconsider their code of conduct again until after the next general local election.

However, if a local government decides not to adopt or review a code of conduct, they will be required to revisit this decision sometime before January 1 of the year of the next general local election.

Public Hearings

Would the public still have the opportunity to provide input on a rezoning where a public hearing is not required?

Under the proposed amendments, local governments will, by default, proceed without a public hearing process when the rezoning (zoning bylaw amendment) is consistent with the OCP. There would already have been a public hearing for the OCP itself during the course of its approval. However, to further maintain transparency, local governments will be required to provide notice to affected property owners that the zoning bylaw is proceeding to first reading.

While the proposed amendments do not require the local government to provide an opportunity for the public to be heard or to consider written submissions in such cases, as with other proposed bylaws, members of the public are always able to contact their council on any matter through, for example, writing a letter or attending a council meeting. These avenues will remain. When local governments make rezoning decisions without public hearings, they also have the option to undertake other kinds of early public engagement, such as information sessions early in the rezoning application processing stage.

If a local government does *opt in* to holding a public hearing when it is not required, what are the procedural requirements that it will need to undertake?

If a local government chooses to hold a public hearing on a rezoning for which a hearing is not

required, it will follow the normal public hearing procedures under existing section 465 of the *Local Government Act*, including providing advance public notice that a hearing will take place. Open meeting rules under local government legislation require these types of matters to be considered at meetings open to the public.

Will guidance material be available for the new public hearing amendment?

Yes. Guidance material will be developed on local government processes and notice in situations where public hearings are not required.

Delegation of Authority for Development Variance Permits

Will guidance material be available on the delegation of authority for DVPs?

Yes. Guidance material will be provided after the changes are brought into force.

Attachment 2 - Consequential Amendments Related to Public Notice Changes

Local Government Act

- All references to publication in a newspaper (except s.659(5)) have been removed from the Local Government Act and replaced with the requirement to post in accordance with section 94 of the Community Charter. This means that all public notices must be posted in the public notice posting places and published in accordance with either section 94.1 or 94.2 of the Community Charter.
- Notice for regional district special meetings has changed to twenty-four hours notice (unless waived by unanimous vote). The notice must be posted at the regular meeting place and the public notice posting places and sent to each Director. There is no longer a requirement to mail notice to Directors five days before.
- Before a regional district procedure bylaw can be amended, repealed, or substituted, notice must now be provided in accordance with section 94 of the *Community Charter*.
 There is no longer a requirement to mail notice to Directors five days before.

Community Charter

• Reference to publication in a newspaper in section 208(3) has been removed and replaced with the requirement to post in accordance with section 94 of the *Community Charter*. This means the notice must be posted in the public notice posting places and published in accordance with either section 94.1 or 94.2 of the *Community Charter*.

Municipal Replotting Act

Notice of a replotting scheme must now be published in accordance with all of section
 94 of the Community Charter, not just 94(1)(b).

Islands Trust Act

- Trust Council and Local Trust Committees must now include public notice posting places in their procedure bylaws.
- Reference to publication in a newspaper in section 49.6(2) has been removed and replaced with the requirement to post in accordance with section 94 of the *Community Charter*. This means the notice must be posted in the public notice posting places and published in accordance with either section 94.1 or 94.2 of the *Community Charter*.

Vancouver Charter

 Notices under Part 1 [Electors & Elections] & Part 2 [Assent Voting] must now be published in accordance with section 3 [requirements for public notice] of the Vancouver Charter.

As the wildfires of 2021 dominated local, provincial, and national news, even people in larger urban centres are now more keenly aware of how precious and vulnerable a resource our forests are. It's safe to say that British Columbians are looking for reassurance from those of us in the forest industry in how we are not only working to mitigate catastrophic wildfires but also how we harvest forests with a focus of stewardship and accountability. Vaagen Fibre Canada is a non-tenured mill, meaning that all our logs are purchased on the open market through partnerships, collaboration, and by forming strong relationships. We manage the land and work closely with the Osoyoos Indian Band, West Boundary Community Forest, local woodlot owners, and other licencees to procure enough fibre to run our community mill.

To us, it's not about **more** wood, it's about **secure and reliable access to fibre** to ensure our mill is viable and can operate at maximum efficiency to benefit workers, First Nations, the communities, and government by way of stumpage.

Here is how we are redefining value-added at Vaagen Fibre Canada.

Utilizing a Variety of Tree Species

Our forests are made up of diverse species of trees, some more desirable to mills than others. Our company has innovated to be able to selectively harvest a variety of tree species and add value in remarkable ways. Here are a few examples:

Increasing Value

Our First Nations partners teach us a lot about being intentional in our forestry work and part of that is taking care of what we have and using only what we need. Our team, together with partners from the Osoyoos Indian Band and West Boundary Community Forest, procure burned wood, blowdown, insect damaged trees, and small diameter timber. We bring in these low value logs and create a higher value product. The work we do gives the forest the best chance to regenerate for future generations.



Selling the Right Log to the Right Mill

In every cutting permit, timber sale, and purchase opportunity, we ensure each log is hauled to a mill that can maximize its value. At Vaagen, we mill small diameter logs which accounts for around 65% of the volume we manage. The other 35% are hauled to other mills that can get the most value from the logs.



Machine Stress Rated (MSR)

We harvest smaller logs which provide a more durable, longer lasting product. Every single board is put to the test and analyzed in our Metriguard certified MSR machine, a one of a kind, patented, non-destructive process. This rating system grades the lumber and adds significant value to boards which were once marginal value logs.

REF: Removing no-standing restriction for general admission (GA) live music venues

Dear Honourable Ministers and MLA D'Eith,

Thank you for all of your efforts on behalf of British Columbians. We appreciate, and share, your commitment to public health.

I am writing to you today on behalf of the remarkable people and places that make up BC's passionate, resilient **live music industry**... the iconic venues such as the Commodore Ballroom, Fortune Sound Club, Biltmore Cabaret, the Rickshaw Theatre and the artists, workers and fans who strengthen BC's world- renown creative vibrancy.

Pre-pandemic, the province benefited from a thriving live music sector where BC's live music companies supported 12,010 FTEs, generated \$619.3 million in BC-based labour income, and contributed \$815.8 million in GDP to the provincial economy. Tourists visiting BC for music-related events contributed a further 2,900 FTEs, \$99.1 million in BC-based labour income, and \$168.7 million in GDP.1 All predictions are that live music will lead the rebuilding of our local and national economies, which is why so many governments, including yours – through Creative BC and elsewhere – continue to support the survival of these cornerstones of our cultural infrastructure. Live music venues are essential to the social, cultural and economic health and well-being of our cities and towns.

On Tuesday, November 2nd the CLMA wrote to Dr. Henry and Dr. Emerson kindly outlining

the key issues and requesting the regulation prohibiting standing in live music concert venues be lifted. We have not received a response or any clarity or rationale as to why that restriction remains.

On Monday, November 15th when Quebec lifts all live music capacity restrictions, BC will become *the only* province in Canada to continue to impose a "no standing" restriction on GA venues. This despite:

- "mingling and standing" are currently allowed in restaurants
- that fans, while 'having a seat' stand, sing and dance during major sporting events or large indoor concerts
- that no scientific data has definitively indicated that standing intensifies the spread of COVID, and
- that live music venues, proud front runners in adopting vaccine passport systems, require ALL patrons to be fully vaccinated.

Returning to live events safely is our top priority, and increased vaccinations are proven to help communities return to full-capacity live events while keeping them safe. Yet still, if we fail to open up GA events at full capacity to fully vaccinated attendees, we will fail local economies, independent venue owners and most certainly artists and workers who have been critically impacted by the pandemic.

Our businesses want to fully reopen and are prepared to do so while protecting the safety of British Columbians. By participating in the vaccine passport program, our members have gone to great lengths to follow the highest level of health and safety protocols. Removing capacity restrictions and allowing full-capacity GA events is a safe and appropriate next step while ensuring parity of reopening and recovery across live events.

We welcome the opportunity to work with your government to lift capacity restrictions to make full reopening possible for all of our live music businesses. We look forward to hearing from you and thank you for your consideration.

Dear Mayor and Councillors

On behalf of the Boundary Invasive Species Society, I would like to thank you for financially supporting the program for so many years. We hope you will continue to financially support the program. For the 2021/22 fiscal year we are requesting \$800.00 towards the terrestrial invasive species program \$300 towards continuing the aquatic invasive species education and monitoring project that we are undertaking this year across the Boundary. We have had some challenges with Covid restrictions this year so continued to focus our education work through newspapers, social media and online with some one on one interactions outdoors where Covid requirements could be met.

The terrestrial invasive plant program includes the coordination and education program that has been operating for years and involves answering public questions, web-based information, educating youth, providing management recommendations, and coordinating the treatment program for all stakeholders. To date this year, activities have included 22 articles to local papers including the Boundary Creek Times, as well as answering public information requests. The program organized treatment of the highway through the City in the Fall, and some manual treatment on Highway 3 and at a site along Boundary Creek. Unfortunately, this year there was no funding for treatment on Crown trails. However, a StongerBC crew (covid stimulus funds through ISCBC) was able to do some work on the trail in Ananconda South of the City. We have certainly received complaints about invasive plants on the trail through Greenwood and will again request funds from the Province for 2022 to address them.

The majority of funding the society receives is dedicated to terrestrial invasive plants, so additional funding is sought each year to enable the inclusion of aquatic invasive species information into the program. The program is a regionwide program to increase awareness in the prevention of new introductions. We have been promoting 'Don't Let It Loose' and 'Clean Drain Dry' as the main messages. The program also includes sampling for mussel veligers at Jewel Lake with funding support from Habitat Conservation Trust Fund. So far this year, all samples were negative.

We hope you recognize the benefit of these programs to the City of Greenwood and will continue to financially support the work of the Boundary Invasive Species Society this year with the funding of \$800 towards the terrestrial invasive plant program and an additional \$300 for the aquatic invasive species side of the program. I have enclosed a copy of our financial statement for the last fiscal year ending March 31st, 2021 and a copy of the proposed budget for the current fiscal year (2021-22), which shows

The Boundary Invasive Species Society was initiated in 1998 in response to public pressure to improve invasive plant management in the Boundary. In the spring of 2003, the committee became a registered charity and is a non-profit society. In 2012 the society expanded its mandate to include education on invasive aquatic species. The overriding objective of the Society is to work cooperatively to effectively manage invasive species in the Boundary to protect our shared environmental, agricultural and recreation resources from further impacts. This is being achieved through an education and coordination program, which provides an extension service to the public, encourages management by inactive individuals and coordinates treatment efforts of all participants in an effective and cost-effective manner.

The Goals and Objectives of the Boundary Invasive Species Society are to:

- 1) Educate the public, private landowners and land managers regarding invasive species and their impact on the biodiversity of lands within the coverage area;
- 2) Assist in coordinating the management of invasive species on public and private lands;
- 3) Promote and implement an integrated management system that considers use of all available methods for the prevention, eradication, control and containment of invasive species;
- 4) Increase awareness of invasive species management amongst industry, resource users, local and provincial governments and encourage expanded support of local weed control programs and initiatives;
- 5) Assist in maintaining a comprehensive invasive species within the area of responsibility;
- 6) Hire and direct staff to fulfill the purposes of the Boundary Invasive Species Society.

Background / Report:

The City of Greenwood Zoning Bylaw includes a minimum exterior lot line setback requirement in the R1 – Residential 1 Zone of 4.5 metres (15 feet).

Section 308(2) of the City of Greenwood Zoning Bylaw No. 683, 1997 provides the following siting exception for steps and eaves:

Where steps, eaves, sunlight control projections, canopies, balconies, or porches project beyond the face of a building, the minimum distance to an abutting front, rear or exterior side lot line as required elsewhere in this bylaw may be reduced by not more than 1.2 metres (4 feet) and the minimum distance to an abutting interior side lot line as required elsewhere may be reduced by not more than .6 metres (2 feet), provided that such reduction shall apply only to the projecting feature.

The applicant constructed a covered basement stairway entrance to the existing residence. The foundation of the stairs is 3.3 metres (10 feet 8 inches) and the eaves are 3.2 metres (10 feet 5 inches) from the exterior lot line. The variance requested was from 3.4 metres (11 feet) to 3.2 metres (10 feet 5 inches).

The Board of Variance performed a site inspection on October 21, 2021. The Board met on November 4, 2021 and approved the requested variance for the steps and eaves from 3.4 metres (11 feet) to 3.2 metres (10 feet 5 inches).
